
robots and drones. We visited the planetarium and learnt about solar flares and constellations.



PSHE:

In January, we started our new focus for PSHE – Mental Health and Wellbeing. This is



such an important topic for young people and as staff we wanted to equip our students with the skills to be able to look after their own mental health and wellbeing. We looked at different ways to look after ourselves and had the opportunity to practice gratitude,

journalling and breathing techniques, amongst other strategies. We finished with students having their own 'toolbox' of strategies to use on a daily/weekly basis to ensure their self-care was a valuable part of their routine. In addition to this, some of our KS4 and KS5 students achieved their AQA Unit Award in Mental Health Awareness. Well done to all our students who achieved this!



We are going to look at budgeting and debt and look at understanding pay slips in detail. We will also look at online payments and fraud. Our overall aim is to give students the skills to confidently manage their own finances, a key life skill for any adult and another step towards preparing our students for adulthood



Humanities:

Key Stage 3 and 4 Humanities students have spent this term learning about Medieval Britain in 1066. They have produced some fantastic work on the Battle of Hastings and the Bayeux Tapestry. Students have completed some extended writing on how William the Conqueror overcame

his problems to takeover and rule England, including learning about the Feudal System and the Domesday Book. A huge well done to the 6 students who will be receiving a AQA Unit Award for their history work on this topic.

GCSE Geography:

After completing our unit of study on Natural Hazard and Climate change, this term students have been preparing for their fieldwork at Cannock Chase and in Stafford. Students need to visit two different



places and collect their own data. Well done to our students who took part – It was a full on day, with lots of walking and tasks to complete. Everyone did really well and should be proud that they participated.



Physical Education:

This term for Key Stage 3 has been table tennis and squash at Stafford leisure centre. All the pupils have improved their ability of both sports and have achieved AQA unit awards. Pupil's behaviour has been excellent when in a public place and it has been a pleasure to teach them.

Key stage 4 PE has been mainly in the gym at Stafford leisure centre. Pupils have gained more knowledge and experience of the gym and how to work different parts of the body. Pupils have shown respect for both the gym and members of the public who have also been there. The plan next term is to carry on with the gym and then look to start their team sport lessons as we approach may half term.

The BTEC group have a great term with a lot recap lessons and practice assessment lessons. They have shown fantastic determination, retention of knowledge and they have now started on their official assessment 1!

Outdoor Education

Outdoor education this term has been at Beaudesert activity centre. Pupils are learning many skills such as team building, resilience and all the physical skills that come from doing the different activities. So far this term pupils have taken part in pedal karts, team building activities, crate stacking, caving and many more. As we approach May half term, pupils will also get the opportunity to try the water sport activities that they offer.

Staff competitions

This half term has seen quite the competitive side of a few staff members, who have been competing to claim the official Haven table tennis trophy. Previously belonging
